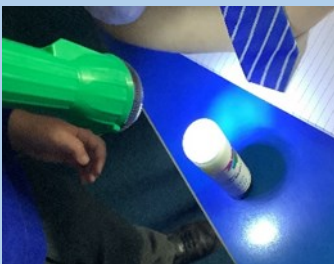
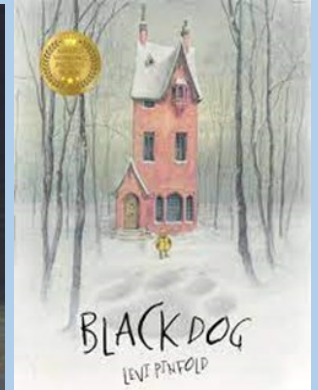
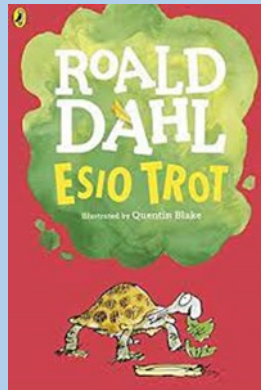

Turning lights on and off showed us how our pupils dilate and constrict depending how much light there is.

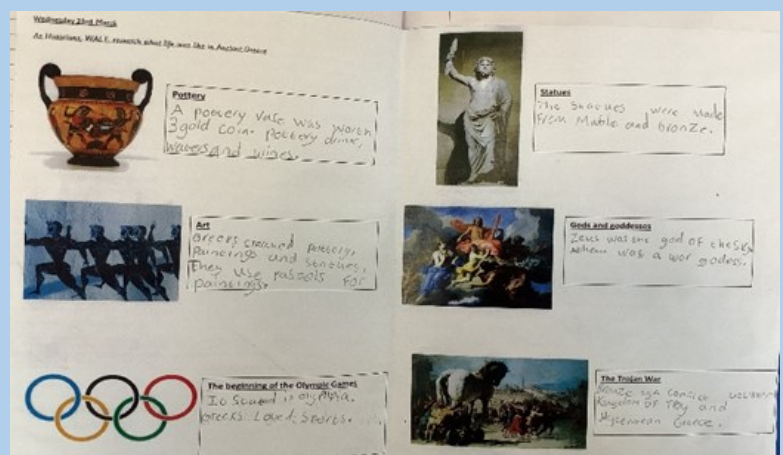


History

At Rosemellin we celebrate inclusivity and diversity. This week is World Autism Acceptance Week. A number of classes have been exploring what it means to be autistic and how it can impact the lives of those with the diagnosis, but more importantly exploring how amazing it can really be. It was World Autism Awareness Day last Saturday. World Autism Awareness Day is an internationally recognized day, celebrated on April 2 every year, where the Member States of the United Nations raise awareness about people with autism throughout the world. With this in mind, I would like to direct you to this video; [Amazing Things Happen - by Alexander Amelines - YouTube](#). The film does a brilliant job of highlighting some of the difficulties faced by those with autism, whilst being an uplifting introduction for young non-autistic audiences, aiming to raise awareness, understanding and tolerance in future generations.

Here are some facts you need to know about autism.

1. You are born with autism. Autism is in fact a difference in the way a brain processes information, and this is something we are born with.
2. You can't grow out of autism. However, with kindness, patience and support, people with autism can learn to cope and thrive.
3. Autism can be the key to great things! Autism is no longer seen as a disease or condition which needs to be cured, and although some people with autism can find life tricky to navigate at times, they can also have heightened senses, higher IQs and some incredible abilities which are not possible for those not on the spectrum.
4. Adults can be diagnosed with autism. Although early diagnosis is preferable, being diagnosed as an adult can help a lot. Please contact your GP for further help and guidance for adult diagnosis.
5. There are more people with autism than we realise. Channel 4 completed a survey of 750,000 undiagnosed people, who all took a basic level test to determine whether they might have autism. A staggering 87,000 participants reached the marker for someone who may have autism, and although not a formal diagnosis, this certainly gives an indication that autism is very under-diagnosed in the UK and more common than we think.
6. Asperger's is autism and is part the name for a specific part of the spectrum.
7. Autism isn't a simple, linear spectrum. Autism involves hundreds of factors, including how we process change, social interaction, basic communication, and forward planning, amongst others, and the infinite combination of these factors makes up the spectrum. What a complex and incredible thing.

We aren't all on the spectrum. This is a common misconception. Diagnosis is complicated and many of us can empathise with and even experience some of the signs of an autistic person, such as social anxiety or even heightened senses. It is a combination of these factors, however, that leads to a person receiving an official diagnosis, and we now know that it is an actual difference in brain activity. We are either autistic or not autistic.

So, please take the time to explore the wonderful world of autism. With kindness, understanding, patience and support we can help make that world even more incredible.

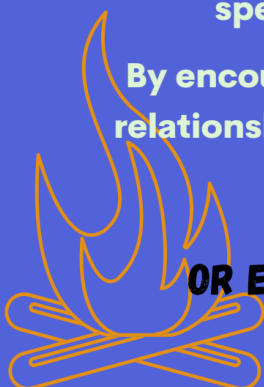
