# Reading



At Rosemellin, we are absolutely crazy about reading! Reading takes place every day in every classroom. Throughout their time at Rosemellin, your child will explore more than 120 high quality texts carefully chosen by the teachers (I did some maths!) in the course of their reading and writing lessons.

This however is not enough. For your child to leave our school with a lifelong love of reading it is essential that they read at home, both to an adult and independently. Numerous studies have shown that, after school, reading fluency and comprehension is the most important indicator of a child's future success.

Please read on for some tips that I, as a parent and a teacher, have found invaluable.

- Read yourself! It doesn't matter what it is, pick up a newspaper or magazine, take a look at a cookery book, read a computer manual, enjoy some poetry or dive into a romance or detective novel. Get your children to join in. If you're cooking, can they read the recipe? If you're watching TV, can they read out the listings?
- Give books as presents. Encourage your children and their friends to swap books with each other, it'll give them a chance to read new stories, and get them all talking about what they're reading.
- Visit the local library together. It's always fun choosing new books to read and keep an eye out for special author events at the library or local bookshops. Children love meeting their favourite authors. Jacqueline Wilson and Anthony Horowitz always have signing queues that are miles long!
- Encourage children to carry a book at all times. That way, they'll never be bored (this is something you can do, too!)
- Have a family bookshelf. If you can, have bookshelves in your children's bedrooms, too.
- Keep reading together. Just because your children are older, it doesn't mean you have to stop sharing stories, perhaps you could try the Harry Potter series or *A Series of Unfortunate Events*.

Don't panic if your child reads the same book over and over again. Let's be honest, we've all done it!

Your child will always have a book from school that they can read which will be matched to their individual reading fluency and comprehension. If you have any questions about this please do not hesitate to contact your class teacher for help.

This Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, after school, in the hall, we will be running our book fair which will give you the chance to select something from a choice of fantastic, thoughtfully chosen books. Every book that you buy means books for our school library. I hope to see you there.

### Early Reading

Encouraging your children to practise the skills they have learnt in school will help them whilst reading their home reading books.

Whilst reading with your child, encourage them to sound out any unfamiliar words by using 'Special Friend', 'Fred Talk', 'Read the Word'. This is the method that we use in school during our RWI Phonics lessons.

We also look out for 'Red Words', these are words that we cannot 'Fred Talk', e.g. the, of, what, could etc.

### What do school governors do?

Governors tend to meet 6 times throughout the year, once every half term, these meetings are usually on a Wednesday at 4pm.

In order to perform this role well, a governor is expected to:

- Get to know the school, including visiting the school occasionally during school hours, and gain a good understanding of the school's strengths and weaknesses;
- Challenge and ask questions of senior leaders to ensure progress towards school goals;
- Monitor the school's development in achieving set priorities;
- Support senior leaders to ensure the school runs as effectively as possible;
- Attend induction and regular relevant training and development events;
- To gain a good understanding of relevant school documentation;
- Attend meetings (twice per term for approximately 1 2 hours);
- Use their expertise from their own professional lives to support and challenge senior leaders;
- Act in the best interest of the pupils and staff of the school;
